CCSA IS A CONSORTIUM OF AMERICAN COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, WHICH OFFERS STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS AND INTERNSHIPS IN ENGLISH-SPEAKING REGIONS.

Currently, CCSA has 24 member institutions in Alabama, Indiana, Kentucky, Mississippi, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota and Tennessee.

A not-for-profit organization, CCSA is headquartered at Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee. Dr. Maggie Monteverde, Executive Director, with the assistance of her staff and guided by policies determined by the CCSA Board of Trustees, annually develops, plans and coordinates study abroad programs in Australia, Belize, England, Ireland and Scotland. Programs to such other English-speaking areas as Canada, Ghana, Hong Kong, India, Jamaica, New Zealand and South Africa are also offered from time to time.

Participants can receive higher education credit (undergraduate, graduate and continuing education, etc.) for successfully completing the CCSA program in which they are enrolled. The classes on CCSA short-term programs are taught by faculty from consortium-member schools. CCSA also offers internships in Dublin, Ireland, as well as semester programs at University of East Anglia and University of Manchester in England. Special non-credit programs, such as choir tours and alumni trips, are planned in English-speaking regions as requested.

WHO CAN GO?

All undergraduate and graduate students in good academic and disciplinary standing are eligible to participate for academic credit in any CCSA program. Regular or part-time students at CCSA member institutions must register for courses through their home institutions. Participants from institutions outside the consortium register as visiting students at Belmont University. CCSA program courses are part of the regular course offerings of member universities; therefore, students may apply for any student loans or grants for which they would normally have eligibility.



HISTORY

In 1982, in an effort to address a common desire to share resources and services throughout the state of Kentucky, a group of faculty and administrators from Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University, Murray State University, Northern Kentucky University and Western Kentucky University met to cooperatively plan, administer and teach low cost, quality and academically sound study abroad programs in Great Britain. Hence, the Cooperative Center for Study in Britain (CCSB) was established.

The consortium's first offerings—one, a travel program to various parts of England and Scotland and the other, a multi-week program based at Queen Elizabeth Hall in London—were made available to students in the summer of 1983. Initially headquartered at Western Kentucky University, CCSB moved to Northern Kentucky University in 1989. In September 1996, as a reflection of the successful expansion of its programs to destinations beyond Great Britain, including Australia and Ireland, CCSB changed its name to CCSA, the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad.

By the mid 1990's, membership in the consortium had grown to over twenty member schools, including both private and public institutions, and while a core constituency of schools continues to be located in the state of Kentucky, the consortium today includes members from ten states. In 2009, Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee became the host institution, where CCSA continues to reside.

The start of the new millennium saw programs offered in a variety of destinations where English is an official and/or historic language, including Belize, Canada, Ghana, Hong Kong, India, Jamaica, New Zealand and South Africa, as well as, of course, its original sites in the British Isles. The intervening years also saw the debut of a variety of CCSA-sponsored internship and semester options, such as an 8-week internship in Dublin and direct enrollment partnerships with the University of East Anglia and Manchester University. An important constant throughout the expansion of both its membership and destinations continues to be the offering of programs that place academic soundness, good value for money and participant safety at the center of all its activities.

Today, CCSA offers programs on four continents, sending at least five hundred students and faculty abroad each year. Course offerings have also grown extensively to include subjects as different as Marine Biology and Fashion Design, Watercolor Painting and Nursing, in addition to regular offerings in Theatre, Business, Psychology, English, History and Political Science. As CCSA enters into its fourth decade, the consortium looks forward to expanding its membership, as well as increasing the diversity of its program offerings, while maintaining the quality of its signature programs in the United Kingdom.

WINTER PROGRAMS - AUSTRALIA, LONDON/DUBLIN, LONDON WINTER

Each year during winter break, CCSA offers a number of short, intensive study abroad programs to a variety of sites in English-speaking countries across the globe.

All programs depart December 26 and return approximately two weeks later. While each program offers a unique set of courses and experiences particular to the sites visited, all involve focused course activities, field trips and cultural enrichment activities which, when combined with the production of final course-related projects submitted after return stateside, enable participants to earn up to 3 semester hours of credit.

All courses are taught by faculty from CCSA member institutions. One does not have to be a student at a member institution to participate in a winter program.

SEMESTER PROGRAMS - UNIVERSITY OF EAST ANGLIA, UNIVERSITY OF MANCHESTER

CCSA has developed partnerships with two of the leading universities in the UK to offer our students the opportunity to enroll directly in their programs as full-time visiting students for a semester or even a year.

The University of East Anglia, located in the historic medieval town of Norwich, was recently voted by English university students to be among the highest in student satisfaction overall, while its programs in Environmental Sciences and Creative Writing have achieved international recognition.

CCSA's other semester partner, the University of Manchester, is also internationally recognized for excellence in research and teaching in a wide variety of disciplines, including music and biology. Regarded by many as the "Second City" of the UK, Manchester is a leader in the production of edgy music and youth-oriented culture. Study abroad students may participate in the university's Leadership and Service Certificate program, which adds involvement in the local community to more traditional academic coursework.

For students interested in giving their resumes a global edge, CCSA offers internship programs in Dublin, Ireland. Placements matched to the specific professional focus and educational background of each applicant are arranged by CCSA's internship partner in this world-leading city. ANTHROPOLOGY

Ethnographic Field School in Belize

This course immerses students in a culture and trains them in contemporary anthropological field methods. Students will gain valuable research skills to apply anthropology in their future careers (e.g., applied anthropology) and an appreciation for cultural diversity and will further their personal growth. Students will learn about the local culture by doing participant-observation and conducting ethnographic interviews in a community-based project. Potential research topics include, but are not limited to, economic, social, political and kinship systems as well as the cultural constructions of identity, race, gender, religion and art.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Generally, running water will be available only in bathrooms, often with no hot water. However, potable drinking water will be provided throughout the trip. Electricity may be limited to certain hours of the day, and cell phone usage and internet access may be limited or lacking altogether at some sites.

Tropical Biology

Experience two of Earth's most diverse ecosystems by exploring both a tropical rainforest and coral reef in Belize. Study the fascinating biotic and abiotic features that characterize these systems and observe the complex interactions of their flora and fauna. In the rainforest, see iguanas, howler monkeys and leaf cutter ants while gaining insight to the Mayan culture and its use of medicinal plants. On the coral reef, the longest in the Western Hemisphere, swim with brilliantly colored reef fish among the diverse assemblage of corals, sponges and other invertebrates.

Prerequisite: one semester of Biology or consent of instructor (3 cr. hrs., UD, Dr. Tracy Livingston [tracy_livingston@ georgetowncollege.edu] Georgetown College)







Join CCSA as the Ireland Early Program visits both Irelands, North and South. While based in Dublin, the capital of the Republic of Ireland, we'll uncover the cultural significance behind Glendalough, Trinity College and places made famous by such writers as James Joyce and Jonathan Swift. Then we'll head North, tracking the history of Ireland, ancient and modern, stopping at the magnificent coastal World Heritage Site, The Giant's Causeway, and visiting locations associated more recently with the Troubles in Belfast and Derry. Then it's off to the beauty of the mountains, valleys and islands of the West of Ireland where Gaelic and traditional music can sometimes still be heard. Discover the beauty and the tragedy, the history and the hope that define this land still struggling to be united.

COMMUNICATIONS/JOURNALISM International News Writing & Reporting

What does it take to be an international news journalist, responsible for covering anything from political revolution to economic upheaval to climate change to war? This course provides students with the opportunity to put themselves "in the shoes" of a contemporary foreign news correspondent. The course is interactive, and students will have the opportunity to explore a range of different topics in Northern Ireland, while developing the skills they need to take a story from conception to publication. Close attention will be paid to writing and critical thinking, two essential qualities of international news coverage.

ENGLISH

The Irish Literary Tradition from The Tain to Toibin

Ireland is a small country with an outsized literary tradition. This course is designed to bring the genius, value and profound fun of that tradition into focus. We will read "greatest hits" of Irish Literature, starting with the tragicomic exploits of Cuchulain in *The Tain Bo Culaigne* and moving on to important works by Swift, Yeats, Synge and several contemporary authors. All of our reading will be enriched by visits to relevant sites of archaeological, mythical and historical significance. Enroll in this course to learn more about Ireland's culture through the imaginations of writers who were inspired by its complex history and stunning natural beauty.

Prerequisite: Students enrolled for lower division (LD) credit should have completed the freshman composition requirements specified by their institution. Students enrolled for upper division (UD) credit should additionally have completed one semester of World or British Literature Survey.

PSYCHOLOGY

Positive Psychology: A Cross-Cultural Study of Well-Being

Positive psychology is the study of the "good life." Psychologists are becoming more interested in the importance of positive emotions, institutions and workplaces. Use the principles of this new field of psychology to study the people and environment of this fascinating country. Potential site visits include the Famine Museum, the National Museum of Ireland, Microsoft Dublin and An Droichead cultural center. Learn about the resilience of the Irish people following the Great Famine and economic bust of the early 2000s. Discussions, guest lectures and a variety of readings will be utilized for comprehension of course content. Come away with an appreciation of the importance of resilience and well-being in working toward a fulfilling, meaningful life. SOCIAL WORK

History of Orphanages & Reformatories: What Went Wrong?

This is an opportunity for students to understand the history of institutional violence against women and children in Ireland. Students will read about and visit sites such as the industrial schools and the Magdalen laundry (workhouse) where children were forced into slavery under horrendous conditions. Students will also learn about Ireland's Magdalen Asylums that served as a detention for women prostitutes and The Holy Saints Magdalen Home for Wayward Girls and Fallen Women where unmarried pregnant women were sent in shame until they delivered, after which the church took their babies away for adoption.

ART

The Art of the Illuminated Manuscript

Dublin, Ireland is home to the Book of Kells, an illuminated manuscript considered one of mankind's greatest artworks. It has inspired generations of artists including literary giants like James Joyce. In this class, students will use visual and verbal journaling to collect imagery and inspiration from Dublin, Cork and Galway while making day trips to many of Ireland's great sites. Trinity College, Glendalough, Blarney Castle, the Cliffs of Moher, the Aran Islands and Waterford Crystalworks are just some of the sites this class may visit. Irish mythology will be emphasized and participants will develop illuminated manuscripts based on their journals. (3 cr. hrs., LD, Prof. Daniel Johnson [dan.johnson@belmont.edu] Belmont University)

COMMUNICATIONS

Risk & Crisis Communication

The purpose of this course is to compare and contrast approaches to risk and crisis communication and emergency management in different countries and media markets. While in Dublin, students will visit public relations agencies that provide crisis communication consultation, emergency planning and response agencies/ organizations, and select businesses and media outlets. Special emphasis is placed on crisis planning, media relationships, image restoration, ethical responses, organizational learning and community and organizational preparedness and response.

Irish poetry, the Irish short story and Irish drama live in a nation known for both conflict and literary imagination, represented especially powerfully in the work of Seamus Heaney, a primary focus of this course. Experience the landscape, the history and the cultural context in which these great works of literature were conceived and produced. From Dublin to Cork to Galway, students will visit museums, homes, libraries, literary centers and bookshops with direct connections to the literary production of this marvelous nation.

HEALTH CARE

"The Best of Times, the Worst of Times": A Tale of Two Countries' Health Systems

This course provides an overview of the continuum of care offered under the health care systems of Ireland and the United States. The continuum of care includes the following: public health/preventive care, primary care, ambulatory/out-patient services, acute care, post-acute care (longterm/nursing home care, home health care/durable medical equipment services, hospice and rehabilitative services), behavioral health services and organ donation practices. Key select aspects of each system—access, quality, cost and continuity—will be explored. Come and explore the Irish musical traditions that influenced their songwriting. Walk the streets of Dublin and drink from the deep well of inspiration that flows from the Emerald Isle. You'll learn to write your own lyrics and engage your creative self. Field trips will include a visit to IMRO, The Irish Musical Rights Organization, to meet with some local singer/ songwriters.

For those traveling on flights arranged by CCSA, the price of the London Summer Program with one course is \$5995. This includes round-trip transportation from designated cities as well as airport transfers to and from the accommodation site.

Included in the program price for all participants on this program are:

- accommodations and meals as detailed below
- ISIC (International Student Identification Card)
- some field trip and excursion-related expenses
- health and emergency evacuation insurance
- London Travelcards (subway and bus pass)
- BritRail Pass for travel by train within Britain

All prices are subject to change in the event of unanticipated increases in airfares, monetary exchange rates or other changes in program costs. In some cases, program items may be deleted in lieu of a price increase.

FEE TO ADD OPTIONAL SECOND CLASS: \$500

ACCOMMODATIONS AND MEALS

Participants in the London Summer Program reside in dormitories of the Hampstead Campus of King's College. While the standard price on this program is based on single occupancy, since the majority of rooms are single, some rooms with double occupancy may be available at reduced cost on a first come/first served basis. Please be aware both that it may not be possible to accommodate all requests for double occupancy on this program and that the reduction in program price is not likely to exceed \$300 per person.

The following meals, provided at the King's College Refectory on campus, are included in the program price: daily breakfast; lunch on Monday and Wednesdays, plus the Friday of final exams; dinner on Monday through Thursday; several meals on the arrival weekend.

ADDITIONAL COSTS

A minimum of \$1200 should be budgeted for meals and basic expenses not covered in the program price. Additionally, approximately \$200 - \$250 should be budgeted for textbooks and other required course materials and/or excursion expenses specific to that course. Students enrolled in two classes should anticipate spending that amount for expenses associated with each class. Participants should also budget additional funds for personal expenses such as souvenirs and independent travel, based upon their individual spending habits.

Tuition is not included in the program costs detailed above. Please refer to Registration/Tuition & Fees in the Program Details section for additional information.





OPTIONAL TRIPS

CCSA also makes available to London Summer participants the option (at additional cost) to participate in two weekend trips to Edinburgh and Paris, as well as a day trip to Stonehenge and Salisbury. Information about these trips--including price, a description of what is included, and how to sign up for them--will be provided after the program application deadline has passed. Before signing up for any of these trips, students should bear in mind that doing so will have an impact on time available for personal travel and exploration. Students who elect to take two classes especially should give careful thought before signing up for more than one optional trip.

PAYMENT SCHEDULE & DEADLINES

Applicants are encouraged to apply well in advance of the February 21, 2014 application deadline, as priority is given to early applications. Applications submitted on or before February 7, 2014 receive a \$100 deduction in the program price, reflected in a reduced application fee, due at time of application.

- **Non-refundable Application Fee**: \$200 if received on or before February 7, 2014; \$300 for applications received after February 7, 2014. The application fee, which must be paid by credit card at time of application, serves as a deposit toward the overall program price.
- **First Payment**: \$2800 due on March 7, 2014; the \$500 second course fee, if applicable, is also due at this time
- Final Payment: \$2895 for those traveling with the CCSA group, \$1695 for those making their own arrangements, due on April 4, 2014

Effective October 1, 2013: As a 501(c)3 educational organization, CCSA will be assessing a 3% surcharge on all credit card transactions. This surcharge will be automatically added to each credit card payment.

Shortly after submission of the online application and fee and completion of the local CCSA Campus Representative Approval Recommendation, applicants will receive an application approval notification. During the online application process, students from non-consortium schools will receive instruction regarding additional application requirements.

An official letter of acceptance into the program will be sent electronically approximately three weeks after the program application deadline, at which time final approval of course selection will be confirmed in your online application.

British Media: It's Another World! is an unforgettable study abroad experience, during which we explore important media sites from London to Liverpool, while we give careful consideration to the ways media in the US and the UK impact us, both as citizens and consumers.

Take a wild ride down the Tube and discover the secrets of 'London Below' depicted in Neil Gaiman's fantasy, *Neverwhere*. Dive into London's East End and trail Jack the Ripper through the gritty backstreet underworld featured in Alan Moore's graphic novel, *From Hell*. Discover why the Guy Fawkes mask from Moore's *V for Vendetta* has inspired Anonymous hacktivists and the Occupy movement. Students will explore how urban fantasist Neil Gaiman and graphic novelist Alan Moore have re-cast the geography of London into a cityscape at once darkly forbidding and fantastically alluring, thereby transforming a generation's perception of the storied metropolis.

Travel back in time to Shakespeare's England. Visit Shakespeare's birthplace, grammar school and church in Stratford, as well as Elizabethan sites in and around London where Shakespeare's company performed his plays, such as Hampton Court Palace and Middle Temple Hall. Explore the literary, cultural and political significance of the writer BBC Radio recently named "Man of the Millennium."

Mystery, Magic & Mayhem-- From Sherlock Holmes to Harry Potter

Why are we attracted to mysteries and enamored with detectives like Sherlock Holmes who solve them? Why do we envy Harry's magical powers? What do these figures tell us about our infatuation with the "rational/irrational," about power and about the culture from which they come? We will read the first "detective novel" in English literature, Wilkie Collins' *The Moonstone*, which influenced Charles Dickens' novels as well as Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's creation of Sherlock Holmes. We'll also study Holmes' stories, Stevenson's Jekyll & Hyde, Agatha Christie's Poirot and Miss Marple and end with some of Rowling's Harry Potter books—with references to Dickens along the way. We'll go see where the Harry Potter films were shot (Alnwick Castle and Oxford) and attend Christie's *Mousetrap*, the longest-running play ever in London to discover sites associated with our reading. We'll even do our own scavenger hunt! You could even come with me on the optional weekend trip to Edinburgh, home to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and J.K. Rowling. Don't miss out; as Holmes announces, "the game's afoot!"

Sherlock Holmes' London: Mystery & the Metropolis

Find clues to Sherlock Holmes' enduring appeal while following his trail throughout London. Though Holmes is Arthur Conan Doyle's most intriguing character, an equally important "character" is London itself, with its labyrinthine streets and criminal underworld. We'll read the Sherlock Holmes stories alongside historical, literary and artistic accounts of Victorian London, including Jack the Ripper's East End. We'll explore Holmes' mysterious metropolis with visits to sites important to Conan Doyle, the Holmes stories, Victorian history and recent Sherlock films and shows. Potential field trips to sites important to Sherlock and Conan Doyle, including Edinburgh, Scotland; England's southern Coast; and Devonshire.

Come explore London, Coventry, Dover and other towns re-shaped by war, and see how civilians lived under the threat of bombs and possible invasion. We'll study the evacuation of nearly 2 million children from London to the countryside and follow the path of city girls who formed a land army to keep farms running. And, of course, we'll explore how the British "keep calm" spirit helped to shape modern Britain and its people.

The class will incorporate visits to museums, film studios and unique sites in London ranging from Eltham Palace to Brick Lane to fully experience contemporary British film and culture.

By reading travel literature about London and Great Britain, researching specific sites and writing about our own experiences, we will gain a deeper understanding of the British people and a greater appreciation for London. Consider the difference between the tourist with a camera only and the travel writer with a camera and all the words of the English language!

ENGLISH/RELIGIOUS STUDIES C. S. Lewis, J. R. R. Tolkien & the Inklings

The Inklings (including C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkien) was a Christian/ fantasy writing group that met in Oxford, where we will visit the Eagle and Child pub, the colleges and the Inklings' homes. From the pens of Lewis and Tolkien came not only *The Lord of the Rings, The Hobbit*, and *Mere Christianity*, but also some of the 20th Century's most enduring scholarship, apologetics and imaginative mythologies. This course will allow you to gain a complete understanding of the works of Lewis and Tolkien in their cultural context of early 20th century Britain haunted by the European wars. Prerequisite: one semester Freshman Composition or First Year Seminar (3 cr. hrs., LD/UD, Dr. Jonathan Thorndike [jonathan.thorndike@belmont. edu] Belmont University) Group B

GEOGRAPHY The Geography of Europe

Study the geography of Europe and the British Isles while experiencing the culture and visiting places of interest in person. See the cities, mountains, coasts and pastoral countryside, as well as locations that are noteworthy for their cultural, political and historical significance. Students will have classroom lecture addressing all aspects of the geography of Europe, with special emphasis on the British Isles. Day field trips will include London, Dover, Canterbury, Oxford or Cambridge and others. Don't miss the opportunity to live geography, not just study it!

HISTORY

Bodies & Knowledge: Making Medicine Modern in Victorian Britain & Beyond

In this course we will examine the transformation of medicine that took place in Great Britain from roughly 1832 to 1920. At the heart of our course is a question: What role did British imperialism play in the development of nineteenth and early twentieth century medicine in London? To answer this question, students will engage in an investigative endeavor involving the physical and cultural landscape of London, as well as independent research developed out of course readings. Students will have an opportunity to learn about the development of several different medical fields, including pharmaceuticals, surgery, dentistry, nursing and epidemiology. We will utilize London's architectural and cultural resources, particularly museums, as well as sources from the time period, including letters, pamphlets, cartoons and newspaper articles to examine the professionalization of medicine in nineteenth and early twentieth century Britain. At the end of the course, students will develop a deeper understanding of the relationship between Britain and its empire and how this relationship enabled the development of modern Western medicine.

INTERIOR DESIGN/ARCHITECTURAL HISTORY Visual Reality: A History of Interiors & the Decorative Arts in England

Experience the wonders of the ancient decorative arts. This will not be a virtual reality class experience but one of visual reality. Enjoy viewing actual castles, churches, houses and interiors designed by world famous architects and interior designers. Learning and understanding furniture styles, designers and accessories of period interiors and cultures becomes an easy task with information gathered from trips in and around London to museums and famous architectural structures. Absorb the centuries of history, and depart with a knowledge and experience that will be your reference point for design in the 21st century. MUSIC/FINE ARTS

Celebs of the British Choral Tradition: A Survey from William Byrd to John Rutter

London provides a fitting backdrop to survey Britain's rich choral music history, and its celebrated composers. Beginning with the early English Madrigal through contemporary composers such as John Rutter, students will explore British choral music through the lenses of lecture, listening, presentations, concert attendance and written critique, and excursions to relevant historical sites.

NURSING/INTERDISCIPLINARY Intercultural Understanding & Communication Relevant to the Delivery of Culturally Competent Care

London is the melting pot of languages and cultures. In this course we will examine how the multicultural nature of London affects health care delivery, as we discuss emerging trends in health care education and cultural and health care beliefs, values and ethics relating to health care professions and decision-making in health care practice. We will also analyze educational issues relevant to the delivery of culturally competent care and analyze legal and ethical issues in local and global health care settings.

Important Note Regarding the Following Course:

The London portion of the following course, "Where's the Evidence," is only two weeks long, ending on July 26. Students who enroll in this class will be required to complete both pre- and post-program assignments, a portion of which will be online starting four weeks before the London portion.

If taken as part of the London Summer Program, this course MUST be taken as a second class (along with a Group B selection). Students who wish to enroll ONLY in this course must instead apply for admission to the 2-week London Health Care Program.

Where's the Evidence? Using Research to Examine End-of-Life Care on Both Sides of the Pond

What can we learn about end-of-life care from our British colleagues? Visit the world famous Cochrane Collaboration at Oxford to learn how to evaluate current best evidence in making decisions about end-of-life care. Visit St. Christopher's Hospice, where Dame Cicely Saunders pioneered the modern hospice movement with her unique foundational belief: "you matter to the last moment of your life...we will help you, not only to die peacefully but to live until you die." Through careful examination of evidence, collaboration with British colleagues and learning gained from world-renowned palliative care centers, learn to identify best directions for guiding end-of-life care. Prerequisite: undergraduate level statistics

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PHILOSOPHY

Biomedical & Research Ethics

Should doctors always tell the whole truth and nothing but? Do patients across the world have the same needs for autonomy, confidentiality and informed consent? Why are HIV/AIDS, malaria and swine flu worldwide ethical concerns? Universal health care: who has it, who doesn't and why? From accounting and art to theology and zoology, students of any major will gain a broad perspective on biomedical and research ethics in this course. By visiting science museums and health care facilities and experiencing London's multiculturalism, we'll prepare ourselves for philosophical explorations of cloning, euthanasia, human experimentation, stem cell research and other thought-provoking topics.

Magic & Science in Elizabethan England

In this course we will study real magic in Queen Elizabeth's England. We will read the works of Sorcerers and Occult philosophers, visit Stonehenge and see actual instruments used in 16th century magical rituals in the British Museum. We will look at magic in Shakespeare's plays and visit Shakespeare's birthplace, Stratford-upon-Avon, and see multiple live productions at the Globe Theatre and elsewhere. Finally, we will study the development of modern science out of magic and alchemy through a study of Sir Francis Bacon, a remarkable polymath. We will track his legacy from Gray's Inn to the Royal Observatory. If you want to explore magic, Shakespeare and the intellectual culture of Elizabethan England, don't miss this class!

Sex, Drugs & Rock 'n' Roll: Music & Drug Subcultures in the US & the UK

The "Mods" used amphetamines to stay up all weekend listening to music. In swinging London and 60's San Francisco, hippies glorified psychedelic music, psychedelic drugs and free love. Raves ran on ecstasy, the "love drug." Why are many subcultures defined by their music and drugs of choice? Are they trying to establish identity, seek spiritual awakening, respond to oppression or just have fun? Using historical and contemporary subcultures as examples, we will explore biological, psychological and sociological factors that may explain how music, sexuality and drugs help define identity for groups that are (willingly or unwillingly) separate from majority culture. Prerequisite: Introduction to Psychology or General Psychology or Introduction to Sociology

THEATRE/CREATIVE WRITING/HONORS All the World's a Stage

This summer, London is your muse and your stage. We'll immerse ourselves in this theatre wonderland, experiencing the raw emotion and magic of live shows and analyzing the literary genius of classic writers like Shakespeare and modern artists like Jez Butterworth. Armed with a new understanding of the basic elements of playwriting and surrounded by inspiration, you'll take up the bardic tradition and write your own short play.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING/ SATELLITE IMAGING

Introduction to Satellite Imaging of the Earth Study how satellites view and measure properties on Earth using visible light, infrared and thermal energy, imaging radar and lasers. Learn how this technology is applied to: disaster response, precision agriculture, geology and forestry. Fundamentals of electromagnetic radiation are presented without extensive mathematics (no calculus). Students will tour the Surrey Space Center and the Surrey Satellite Technology company where satellites are manufactured and controlled in orbit. Side trips to Stonehenge and London, with visits to the Royal Observatory and the British Museum, are included.

APPLICATION & ADMISSION

All undergraduate and graduate students in good standing are eligible to participate in any CCSA program. Application to CCSA programs must be submitted online through our website at www.ccsa.cc, which will guide applicants through easy-to-follow step-by-step instructions for the application process and submitting the required application fee. Acceptance to the program for eligible applicants will be based upon date of submission, together with application fee. 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CANCELLATION POLICY

An applicant can cancel his/her planned participation in a CCSA program by notifying the CCSA Central office immediately via email <u>data@ccsa.cc</u>. The level of refund for cancelled program participation varies according to specific circumstances, as detailed below:

- Individuals who cancel before or on the application deadline will receive a full refund of any monies paid to CCSA, minus the non-refundable
 application fee.
- Individuals who cancel after the application deadline and before/on the first payment deadline will forfeit the non-refundable application fee and will also be responsible for any unrecoverable expenses* incurred by CCSA on their behalf.

Note: the foregoing standards also apply to applicants whose participation is involuntarily canceled by CCSA due to the applicant's failure to remain in good standing or complete required preconditions for participation, such as holding a valid passport, completing visa requirements (where applicable) in a timely fashion, etc.

TRIP CANCELLATION INSURANCE

Applicants are strongly encouraged to consider purchasing trip cancellation insurance. This insurance is available through most travel agencies or by doing a web search for trip cancellation insurance. Student and Faculty applicants are encouraged to contact STA Travel for information about the low cost travel insurance available to them in connection with the ISIC card provided by CCSA.

SCHOLARSHIPS & FINANCIAL AID

Each member institution may have scholarships available for study abroad. Through its member institutions, CCSA sponsors the Michael A. Klembara Scholarship Program, with individual institutions setting their own policies for the awarding of these funds. Applicants from non-consortium schools are encouraged to apply through the CCSA Central Office for the Michael and Linda Klembara Scholarship for Non-Consortium Students.

CCSA program courses are part of the regular course offerings of member institutions; therefore, students may apply for any student loans or grants for which they would normally have eligibility. The campus representative will assist students needing information about financial aid. The CCSA Central Office notifies financial aid offices at member institutions of program prices. It is imperative that students applying for financial aid apply well before the application deadline dates in order to facilitate the financial aid process. MasterCard and Visa are accepted for program payments.

HEALTH & EMERGENCY EVACUATION INSURANCE

As part of the program price, participants are provided limited health insurance for the duration of their study abroad program. Coverage for situations occurring during the policy period includes sickness, injury, emergency medical evacuation, emergency reunion, accidental death and dismemberment and repatriation of remains. Details of coverage will be sent to participants upon receipt of the CCSA program application.

CCSA strongly urges all individuals to receive a physical examination prior to participation in a study abroad program. A physical examination is required of all participants in the Internship and the Semester in England programs. Prescriptions for any medications taken regularly should be filled before leaving the U.S.

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

There is no better way to absorb the culture and experience a new country than to WALK! CCSA programs can be physically demanding, especially for participants who are not used to walking. If you can walk at least 3 miles without stopping and climb 2-3 (long) flights of stairs without getting short of breath, you probably are fit enough to tolerate what you can expect to encounter on most study abroad programs.

To get in shape, you should begin an exercise program at least six weeks before your study abroad program begins. If you have health problems or have not previously participated in an exercise program, you may need to consult your health care provider first for advice. Once abroad, you may find yourself walking five or more miles each day, so it is also a good idea to break in new walking shoes. If you wait until you arrive at your destination brand new shoes may equate to brand new blisters.

PASSPORT/VISA

The U.S. State Department recommends, hence CCSA requires, passports be valid for a minimum of six months beyond the date you return to the U.S. Participants not in possession of a current passport should apply for one immediately. Passport processing can take 4-6 weeks. Please review individual program details for further information, as a few of CCSA's programs require specific visas. Please contact your local post office to obtain information regarding passport application and processing.

Additional information from the CCSA Central Office will be shared with those individuals who are participating in programs to countries where visitor visas are required of U.S. citizens.

Non-U.S. citizens should contact their home-country embassy in the United States, as well as the embassy or consulate of the country to which they are traveling, to determine which documents are needed to enter CCSA destination countries. They should also contact the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service to find out which documents are needed to re-enter the United States and whether their leaving the United States is likely to have an adverse effect upon their U.S. resident status.
